# Coastal Walking Track <br> (Awabakal Country) 

1 h 30 min to 2 h 30 min

Starting from the end of Spoon Rocks Road this circuit walk takes you from Caves Beach to Pinny Beach where you can have a swim and then continue to the headland with great views over the coast and ocean. Let us begin by acknowledging the Awabakal people, Traditional Custodians of the land on which we travel today, and pay our respects to their Elders past and present.

Getting to the start: From Pacific Highway, A43

- Turn on to Old Pacific Highway Exit then drive for 330 m
- At roundabout, take exit 2 onto Old Pacific Highway and drive for another 215 m
- At roundabout, take exit 2 onto Old Pacific Highway and drive for another 550 m
- Keep right onto Pacific Highway Onramp and drive for another 1.8 km
- At roundabout, take exit 3 onto Bowman Street and drive for another 760 m
- Turn left onto Caldwell Street and drive for another 95 m
- Turn right onto Macquarie Grove and drive for another 980 m
- Turn left onto Middle Street and drive for another 300 m
- Turn right onto Caves Beach Road and drive for another 1.1 km
- Continue onto Spoon Rocks Road and drive for another 420 m


## Before you start any journey ensure you;

Find the gate at the start.


After another 165 m veer right.


After another 235 m veer left.


After another 20 m find the "Pinneys Lookout" (6 $m$ on your left).


Pinney's Lookout overlooks the northern side of Pinney's Beach on the Wallarah Peninsula. From this timber platform, the whole of Pinney's Beach can be seen, including Pinney's Headland to the south. Some of the timber on this lookout was missing when visited, so take care.

After another 30 m find the "Pinneys Beach" ( 145 m on your left).


Pinney's Beach is a good beach for fishing, surfing and swimming. This beach is accessible on foot, via the coastal walk. This beach is not patrolled and rock platforms can be dangerous, even when the seas appear calm. Personal fishing is permitted off all the coast in Wallarah National Park, although a licence is needed. A midden (dated to about 1200 years old), with about 20 stone artefacts, was discovered here in the 1960s, but unfortunately 4WD vehicles have caused erosion to this site.


After another 10 m cross the bridge (about 6 m long)
After another 15 m turn left.

After another 15 m head through/around the gate.

After another 85 m continue straight.

After another 10 m cross the bridge (about 15 m long)

Start of an optional side trip: Side trip to Pinney Beach.



After another 15 m come to the end.

Turn around and retrace your steps back the 15 m to the main route.

Back at the main route continue straight and follow on from the 1.3 km waypoint.
Back at the main route turn right and follow on from the 3.7 km waypoint.

After another 3 m turn right.

After another 165 m head through/around the gate.


After another 135 m turn left, to head along West Pinney Trail.


After another 460 m (at the intersection of Southern Headland Trail \& West Pinney Trail) turn left, to head along Southern Headland Trail.
After another 70 m (at the intersection of Southern Headland Trail \& Shark Hole Trail) continue straight, to head along Southern Headland Trail.

After another 120 m continue straight, to head along Southern Headland Trail.

After another 135 m veer left.

After another 155 m pass the "Nudie Cave" (65 m on your right).

## Continue straight

After another 65 m find the "Pinney's Headland Lookout" ( 30 m on your right).

There are magnificent vistas from Pinney's Headland Lookout, particularly to the north. The headland is accessed on foot via the Wallarah Peninsula coastal walk, and the headland itself has a loop walking trail on it. At the southernmost point of this walking loop, there are unfenced rock platforms forming the ocean shoreline - take care.
Then pass the "Pinny Cave" ( 85 m on your right).
After another 215 m continue straight, to head along Southern Headland Trail.

After another 120 m (at the intersection of Southern Headland Trail \& Shark Hole Trail) continue straight, to head along Southern Headland Trail.


After another 70 m (at the intersection of West Pinney Trail \& Southern Headland Trail) turn right, to head along West Pinney Trail.


Start of an optional side trip: Side trip to Pinney Beach.
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After another 15 m come to the end.

Turn around and retrace your steps back the 15 m to the main route.

Back at the main route continue straight and follow on from the 1.3 km waypoint.
